

Diagnosis Bottom(?) CLBSD" (?). Returned to duty April, 65. Assigned to the invalid Corps on May 2, 1864. Occupation, carpenter. Several pay vouchers with receipts are shown. He was captured in Macon, Ga April 20, 1865 by 1st Brigade, 21st Cav. Div. General Wilson's raiders. Occupation listed as "Hunter". Drew his pension in Campbell County.

Pope, Micajah (Micahah)

Private

Enlisted in Feb., 1862 in Carrollton by Sgt. Hood.

Claim of deceased Officers and Soldiers from Georgia, which were filed for settlement in the office of the Confederate States Auditor for the War Dept. Where died, Richmond, VA. Filed Dec. 20, 1862. Presented by father Rhodes(?) Pope. He died on Aug. 12, 1862, cause of death not stated.

Powell, W. F. S. or William Francis Speight Powell

Captain of Company F, Cobb's Legion, Infantry

Elected Captain of the company on August 15, 1861 at Carrollton.

He was known as William F. S. or W. F. S. He was born December 30, 1818 in Washington County, GA, son of John Powell, and married "Webby", March 28, 1844, in Coweta County, GA and died June 5, 1897 in Newnan, GA. He was a 43-year-old Methodist Episcopal South minister living in Fairplay District-Flint Hill the time of his being made Captain. The 1860 CC Census shows his wife as Webby Durinda Redwine Powell (36) and children Susan A.(14), Mary E.(12), Martha E. (10), Susan T.(7), Louisa (6), John W. S.(3), and Lester R.(1). Webby died June 9, 1879 (buried in the Powell Cemetery alongside William) and he then married Martha Fain Robinson. In 1860, he was the owner of 11 slaves. His real estate in Carroll County was valued at \$6,000 and his personal estate at \$9,2000, large amounts for this time. He was the owner of 150 improved acres and 200 unimproved acres producing 3 bales of cotton and the owner of 79 head of livestock. He lived in Carroll County for several years before the war then moved back to the Powell Plantation in Coweta after the war. John Powell's Plantation in Coweta County was very large with many slaves. He is buried in the Powell Plantation Cemetery near Newnan. This abandoned cemetery is located in the Lake Hill subdivision a few miles north of Newnan on U. S. 29 in the woods on the left just as one enters the subdivision. The grave is marked by a nice monument as well as a government marker. He and his brother, Levi Thomas G, founded and served several churches in Carroll and Coweta counties including Powell's Chapel, Concord Methodist in Hickory Level and Temperance in Sand Hill all three in Carroll County. He never held a charge for money.

1862 absent on furlough from 26 January. February, 62 shows him absent from Camp Marion on furlough for 25 days and by ? for 15 days. Records show that he preached to the brigade and to Cobb's Legion's men several times at Camp Marion in 1862. August 15, 1862, "assigned June 24, 1862" ["resigned" ?] There are numerous copies of requisition for tools, food, shelter, arms etc for his time in the Yorktown area and the establishment of Camp Marion. Pay voucher of June, '62 for amount of \$260, forage 0. He resigned from the army June 23, 1862 and was succeeded by 1st Lieutenant George W. Moore. The muster roll of the company dated Sept.-Oct., 1862 shows him absent. Another roll shows that he resigned on June 25, 1862. Nothing additional in the Service Records has been found. He is reported to have been a member of a militia company in Sand Hill area in 1864 and to have served as chaplain of army units after he resigned his commission..

Putman, James D.

Private, Corporal

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.

On Captain Moore's roster of June, 63 he is listed as 1st Corporal. Is listed on the Confederate Roll of Honor for his service at Gettysburg, July, 1863. July-Aug., 1864 roll, the last one that is shown for the company, he is listed as absent, missing.. Supposed to have been captured. June 1, 1864 he was captured at Gaines Mill (Cold Harbor). June 27, 64, he is Prisoner of War Point Lookout, MD. Joins United States Service. Mustered into United States Service as a private on July 22, 1864 at Norfolk, VA to serve 3 years. Mustered out with his company May 10, 1866. Deserted his company. Buried Mt. Zion, born March 29, 1938, died June 1, 1928.

Rash, Mat. J.

Private

Enlisted August 15, 1862 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.

Captain Moore reports this man deceased at Richmond, May 15, 1862. We found no records on this man in the Archives. There is a M. Rash listed on the Annie Wheeler roster.

Reynolds, Alpheus W.

Private

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell. Age 20 years

Nov.-Dec., 1862, present. July, 1862 he was on furlough at ?. July, 64 shows him on extra duty as a teamster through Nov., 1864. He was a 20-year-old farmer living at home in the Fairplay District-Flint Hill with father, Jas. W. (48) and mother, Elizabeth and 7 siblings. The 1870 CC Census shows Alpheus as 26 years old, a farmer, wife, Missouri (28) and John (4), Enoch(2) and Ephraim (infant). Living in Villa Rica in 1921. Buried Little Vine Church Cemetery, born 1839, died 1936.

Reynolds, John E.

Private

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.

August, 1861, present, wagoner, Dec., 61 extra duty as Wagoner. Same through April, 62. Captain Moore reports that this man deserted, no date, place or cause given. He was carried on Captain Moore's roll in June, 1863. There is a John E. Reynolds buried in Old Providence Cemetery on Helton Road near the Douglas County line, born Oct. 15, 1841, died Oct. 5, 1863. We do not know if this man did desert and go home or if he was sick and went home, he evidently died at home. It is probable that these two Reynolds members of Company F are brothers or otherwise related since they joined together and both were teamsters. I believe that they were both sons of Jas. W. as John "W"(21) and "Alpheus"(19) are in this household in 1860, Buried at Old Providence Church Cemetery. Oct. 15, 1841-Oct. 5, 1863

Shinn, James M. Private
 Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.
 Died at camp near Richmond on May 19, 1862, cause not given. Claim of deceased presented by Mahalia A. Shinn, wife, on June 25, 1862. She drew a pension in Carroll County and Fulton County..

Starnes, John C. Private
 Enlisted March 4, 1862 in Carrollton by Lt. Hood. Age 27
 May-June and July-Aug., 1862 listed as Absent Without Leave. Nov.-Dec., 62 is listed as present. Jan. 9, 63 at Chimborazo Hospital #6 diarrhea. May 6, 1863 he is back in Chimborazo with wound, left hip. Wounded Battle of Chancellorsville. June 11, 63 in hospital at Montg (?) Springs, VA. AWOL since April 1, 1864.
 He is one of the four men of the company with the name of Starnes. He is the only one not listed on the 1910 Annie Wheeler roster. We do not know if these men are related. (?) His widow drew a pension in Cobb Co.

Starnes, Peyton P. Private
 Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell
 April 15, 1862 present, Nov., 62 he is listed as being on extra duty. May 6, 1863 he is admitted to Chimborazo #4," c w left leg."
 Wounded at Chancellorsville. May 19, 63 he deserted the hospital. His name next appears on Captain Kelly's Lumpkin Guard Cavalry company roster. No further records found.

Starnes, Sidney M. Private
 Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by captain Powell.
 Died at a private residence in Richmond July 3, 1862. Reason unknown. Claim filed by his father, Shubill(?) Starnes July 13, 1862.

Starnes, William A. 4th Corporal
 Enlisted on August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell Age 22
 July-Aug., 1862 he is listed as being Absent With Out Leave. He was wounded at Cramptons Gap, MD on Sept. 14, 1862. (Captured ?). May 6, 63 he is in Chimbarazo Hospital #4 in Richmond "c w right thigh" wounded at Chancellorsville. May 7, 63 he was transferred to Lynchburg. Roll of July-Aug., 1864 shows him Absent With Out Leave since April 1, 1864. Last roll call for the company is for Sept.-Oct., 1864 and he is not listed. No further record found.

Stidham, James H. (Or Stalham, James ?) Private
 Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.
 The Annie Wheeler roll lists a James "Stalham". There are a few records in the Archives for a James Stalham. Oct., 1861 he is in the Episcopal Church Hospital in Williamsburg, VA with typhoid fever. Dec., 61 he is absent in hospital in Richmond. July, 1862 payment to discharged soldiers. Discharged July 26, 1862. No reason given.
 He was a 35-year-old farmer of the Kansas District living on farm with wife, Cilla (32) and children Dianna (7) and Martha J. (3). His father is listed as owning 5 slaves.

Stripling, James W. G. Private
 Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell. 21 years old.
 Nov.-Dec., 61, present. May-June, 62. Nov.-Dec., 62, present returned to duty from hospital in Lynchburg, VA hospital. Nov., 62, absent in hospital. Chimborazo Hospital # 2, May 28, 1863, wounded at Chancellorsville on May 3, 1863 "N. S" left arm and breast. Furloughed for 40 days June 17, 1863. Drew and signed for clothing at hospital Sept. 2, 63. July-Aug., 64 listed as present. Dec. 21, 64 he is in General Hospital # 3, Lynchburg, VA and card state, "transferred to General Colston" (?). The Archives records do not show that he surrendered with Gen. Lee at Appomattox but other records do show that he did along with Henry M. Stripling. Probably they were brothers (?). Note: One card in this man's file dated November, 1862 states that J. W. G. Stripling died in hospital in Culpepper, VA. This card must surely be in error as we have him wounded at Chancellorsville in May, 1863. There is a J. W. Stripling listed on the 1910 Annie Wheeler roster. Captain Moore shows James W. G. Stripling present on his June, 1863 muster roll. We did not find him listed on the 1860 CC Census but he is in the 1870 CC Census as: Works farm and is 28 years-old living in Carrollton born in GA. Wife, Susan (25) and children Dora(5), John(4) and Lula(2). A James Stripling is listed as the owner of 1 slave.

Stripling, Henry M. Private
 Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell. Age 32
 Nov.-Dec., 1861, present. July, 62, present. Nov.-Dec., 62, present. Admitted to Winder General Hospital Sept. 26, 62 and returned to duty on Oct. 27, 62. May 6, 63 at Wayside Hospital in Richmond. May 7 he was sent to Lynchburg, VA. He was wounded on May 3, 1863 at Chancellorsville in the arm. Drew clothing and signed for same on Sept. 30, 1864 and several other times at the hospitals. May-June, 64, present. July-Aug., 64, present. Report of Prisoners of War belonging to the Army of Northern Virginia who have been this day surrendered by General Robert E. Lee CSA commanding said Army, to Lt. Gen. U. S. Grant, commanding Armies of the United States. Appomattox Court House, VA, April 9, 1865. He thus was one of the 7 men, 1 corporal and 6 privates, from Company F who surrendered with General Lee at Appomattox. Their fellow company, Company B of Bowdon surrendered 1 corporal and 3 privates. The entire seven companies of Cobb's Legion, Infantry, surrendered 55 enlisted men. His widow drew a pension in Carroll Co. and his widow, Sarah J. in Floyd County. Henry Stripling was a 32-year-old farmer in 1861 living in the 5th District-Chanceville with wife, Sarah(23) and children Georgia(8), Mary E.(7), and Martha C.(1). In the 1870 CC Census he is listed as a 40 year-old farmer living in Carrollton with wife Sarah (34) and children Mary(13), Catherine(11), John (8), Lula(6), Jane(2) and Ann(infant).

Stripling, William B.

Private

Enlisted March 20, 1862 at Carrollton by Lt. Hood.

July-Nov., 1862, absent since Battle of Crampton's Gap, MD on September 14, 1862. Killed at Crampton's Gap, MD. Nov.-Dec., 62 reported missing, supposed to have been killed at Crampton's Gap, MD Sept. 14, 1862. On register of Officers and Soldiers from the Army of the Confederate States who died from wounds or disease. Killed in Battle. When deceased, September 14, 1862. Born in GA. The 1860 Carroll County Census shows him living in the 6th District-Hickory Level. A 21 year-old farmer and wife Elizabeth(19) and son Moseley(1). He was the son of The Reverend James Stripling, Methodist Minister of Carroll County and who lost sons William and David to the Cause. We do not believe that these 3 Stripling men were brothers or know if they were related.. (?)

Swofford, Sol Willis.

Private

Enlisted February 15, 1862 at Carrollton by Sgt. Hood.

July-Nov., 1862, absent, wounded and taken prisoner at Crampton's Gap, MD on September 14, 1862. Nov.-Dec., 62, absent at home taken prisoner at Crampton's Gap. Date of parole not given. He is on the roll of Prisoners of War at Fort McHenry, Baltimore (no date) captured at South Mountain, Sept. 14, 1862. AWOL since April 1, 1864. No further records.

He was a 29-year-old farmer living in the Fairplay District-Flint Hill in 1861. He is listed as being born in North Carolina. Cannot read or write. Wife, Polly (21) cannot read or write and born in South Carolina and children, James W, (2) and William (1). He is buried in the Powell's Chapel Cemetery. Born Aug. 7, 1830, Died July 6, 1887. Wife, Polly Hembree, lies beside him. Polly drew a pension in Douglas County then transferred to Carroll County at least through 1904.

Swan, James C.

Private

Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell.

Killed at Crampton's Gap, MD on September 14, 1862. On register of Officers and Solders from Georgia who died from wounds or disease. Where born, Henry County, GA. On Register of claims of deceased which were filed for settlement in office of Confederate States and for the War Dept. Filed by William Swan, father

Turner, Levi J. W.

Private and Sergeant

Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell.

Dec., 1861, enlisted man on extra duty as Wagoner. Jan., 62, detailed as wagoner. Feb., 62, teamster. Feb. 14, 62, sick furlough. June 5, 1863 he is in Chimborazo # 2 in Richmond with pneumonia. Transfer to Danville, VA June 12, 63. Several other hospital stays are listed on cards. He is on the Roll of Prisoners of War at Newport News, VA not dated. Where Captured, Sailors Creek, VA on April 6, 1865. Name appears as signature to an Oath of Allegiance to the United States subscribed and sworn to at Newport News, VA. June 24, 1865. Place of residence, Carroll County, GA., Complexion fair, eyes grey, hair dark, height 6 feet. Captured near Farmville, VA April 6, 1865.

The 1860 CC Census shows him a 25-year-old farmer of the 6th District-Hickory Level. Living at home with his father, Hiram (49) a farmer and mother Caroline (43) and brothers Allen (23) and Irvin S. (21). In 1870 it shows "J. W." Turner (34) born in GA with wife Sarah (29) and Joseph (3), Michael (2) and Hiram (infant). Buried Concord Methodist Church, Hickory Level. 1813-1916

Turner, W. H.

Private

Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell.

Died July 1, 1862 near Richmond. Register of claims of deceased soldiers from GA. Claim filed by J. M. Turner (father ?) Claim filed Aug. 13, 1862. Amount found due, \$68.63. Left no wife or children. Several letters regarding the claim are included but not readable. He is not on the Annie Wheeler roster of 1910. Captain Moore reports him as deceased. Not listed on the 1860 or 1870 CC Census.

Tyson, John F.(?)5th Sergeant, 1st Sergeant, 3rd Lieutenant, 2nd Lieutenant, 1st Lieutenant

Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell.

John F. Tyson is listed on the Annie Wheeler roster as the company's 5th Sergeant and on Captain Moore's roster as 3rd Lieutenant. 2 Feb, 62, in Carroll County on sick furlough. Wounded on Sept. 14, 62 at Crampton's Gap, MD. July-Nov., 1862 listed as present and promoted to 3rd Lieutenant from MS. Dec., 1862, "not yet commissioned." Promoted to Jr. 2nd Lt. February 7, 1863. Promoted to 1st Lieutenant on March 12, 1863. There are cards showing his making numerous requisitions for clothing, food, arms and ammunition and other supplies. May-June, 1864 absent, missing, killed or captured at Cold Harbor, June 1, 1864. July-Aug., 64, absent killed or captured at Cold Harbor 1st day of June, 1864. On a roster dated Jan., 1865 elected 2nd Lieutenant Sept. 15, 1862, promoted March 12, 1863 to 1st Lieutenant. Successor, Charles Martin. On roll of Prisoner of War at Fort Delaware, where capture, Gaines Farm [Cold Harbor] June 1, 1864, received from Point Lookout, MD. His name appears as signature to Oath of Allegiance to the United States at Fort Delaware, DE. Place of residence, Carroll, GA. Complexion dark, hair dark, eyes blue, height 5' 10". Released June 17, 1865. There is a card for J. Tyson dated Sept. 9, 1864 near New Market, VA stating that he was absent, Prisoner of War since June 1, 1864. . The 1860 CC Census shows him as a 32-year-old farmer, born in North Carolina, living in the 2nd District-Villa Rica with wife Elizabeth (30) and children Horatio (9), William (6), Nancy (3) and Joseph (1). (The 1860 Carroll County Census also shows a John Tyson (18) a farmer living at home with his mother, Nancy (45) (born in South Carolina and who cannot read or write) brother, Alex (16) and sister, Elizabeth (12). We doubt that this 18-year-old would be promoted to a Commissioned officer so quickly. This is probably not John F. Tyson (?).)

The 1870 census shows John Tyson (41) Farmer, Carrollton, born in North Carolina, wife Elizabeth (40), James H. (19), (this was Horatio on the 1860 census), William (16), Nancy (13) and Joseph (11).

Tyson, Madison L.2nd Lieutenant

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.

He is listed on the Annie Wheeler list as the original 2nd Lieutenant of the company. He is not listed on Captain Moore's June, 1863 list but his list shows no top 2nd Lieutenant. A roll of March, 1865 shows that he resigned September 1, 1861. One card shows him as 2nd Lieutenant of Co. F, Cobb's Legion, Infantry. Other records show that he was elected 2nd Lieutenant on August 25, 1861. Another card

says his resignation was accepted Sept. 6, 1861. Another card gives date of resignation of Aug. 27, 61 successor W. B. Lowe. Drew \$61.33 pay. We find that he enlisted as a private in Company G, 41st Georgia Infantry, a company formed by Col. Charles McDaniel of Carroll County men, on March 4, 1862. He was elected 2nd Lt. on May 6, 62. Captured with the entire garrison at Vicksburg on July 4, 1863. Paroled there on July 6. Wounded at New Hope Church on June 1, 1864. Roll for Dec. 31, 1864 the last on file, shows him present. Alexander and Clement Tyson, his first cousins, were also members of this company of the 41st Georgia Infantry. The 1860 CC Census shows him to be a 20-year-old (born in Meriwether, Co., GA on 7 Aug., 1840) farmer living in the 10th District-Carrollton wife, Catherine (Broome)(19), "Married within the year." After the war, he moved to Arkansas and died there in 20 July, 1890. His widow drew a pension in Harrison, Boone Co., AR beginning in 1905 for \$50/yr. He was the son of Josiah and Mahala McGahee Tyson of near Villa Rica, GA. Although near 50 years of age, Josiah, along with another son John Dixon, enlisted in the Confederate Army in May, 1864 and was assigned to Company F, 1st Georgia (Fannis's) Reserves and served as a guards at Andersonville Prison. Madison J. is the owner of 1 slave and Josiah is the owner of 7.

Tyson, William L.

1st Sergeant, 3rd Lieutenant, 2nd Lieutenant

We quote a report from Captain Moore, Captain of Company F, Cobb's Legion, to Captain William Walker McDaniel, Captain Company B Cobb's Legion Infantry. The date of the report is not readable but it was probably written in mid to late 1863 as Captain McDaniel was promoted to Major of the Legion after Spotsylvania in May and was probably serving in that capacity at the time of this report. Captain Moore was captured at Knoxville in Dec., 1863 so it would have been before this date. "Wm. Tyson enlisted on August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell. Promoted to 2nd Lieutenant July, 1862 and was mortally wounded at Cramptons Gap, MD on September 14, 1862 and died at Burkettsville, MD 17 October, 1862. He was last paid July, 1862. Now due \$205.25 for 2 mos. 17 days at \$80 per mo. Volunteered for the war and never received bounty. Geo. W. Moore, Captain Co. F, Infantry, Cobb's Legion." Killed at Crampton's Gap, MD. Date of wound received Sept. 14, 1862. Died October 17, 1862. Elected 2nd Lieutenant July 24, 1862. Succeeded by John Tyson. He is on a list of wounded POW paroled after the Battle of Crampton's Gap, Sept. 14, 1862 by General Franklin from field hospital, Burkettsville, MD, "wounded both thighs." Claim of deceased filed by mother Nancy of Sand Hill on Sept. 11, 1863.

1860 census show him living in the Fairplay District-Sand Hill, a 20 year-old farm laborer living in the household of Jesse Cockerell (53). He was the son of Dixon and Nancy Sasser Tyson. We do not know how of if the three Tyson men of Company F are related but we believe that John and William are brothers and Madison their 1st cousin.

Upshaw, James

Private

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.

Captain Moore shows this man discharged. No date or reason is given. Nov.-Dec., 1862, Discharged at Camp Marion. Nov. 26, 62 he is on Register of Payment of Discharged Soldiers, Date of Discharge, December 3, 1861. Date of payment, December 3, 1861. No reason given. No other records found. In 1860 he was a 46-year-old farmer living in the 10th District-Carrollton with wife, Jane (35) and Allen (14), Milligan (12), Thomas (10), and Joseph (8). The 1870 census shows him a farmer, Carrollton, with wife Jane (43)

Vaughn, George W.

Private

The return of November, 1862 shows him absent, wounded Sept. 14, 1862 at Cramptons Gap, MD, on furlough at Carrollton, GA time and period unknown. He was in General Hospital Camp Winder, Richmond on Oct. 11, 62 and furloughed for 20 days, admitted Sept. 30. May-June, 1864 absent supposed to have been captured at Cold Harbor on June 1, 1864. On roll of POW at Point Lookout, MD released June 16-20 on joining the United States Service. Date of release: June 27, 1864. Date of capture: June 1, 1864. Where: Cold Harbor. Branch of service: Army. Deserted to enemy.

His widow, Sarah Jane filed for a Confederate pension in Campbell Co then transferred to Clayton County, GA.

Walker, Floyd

Private

One card stated that he enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell. Another card states that he enlisted 11th day of August at Licksillet for the war and now entitled to bounty. Nov.-Dec., 1861, absent in hospital in Richmond, last official account supposed he is discharged. Paid \$23.52 from 11 Aug. to 28 Oct., 1861 and reason for discharge, Surgeon's Certificate of Disability.

Ward, Asa F.

Private

Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell.

Nov.-Dec., 1861 present. Another card for Nov.-Dec., 1861 states, "Transferred from Captain McDaniel's Company B, Cobb's Georgia Legion." He is not listed on any Co. B roster and evidently never served with it although he might have joined but for some reason missed mustering in with them on June 30, 1861 at Bowdon. He then signed with Co. F on August 15. We believe that he was a cadet at Bowdon College. July-Oct., 62 absent, wounded. Nov.-Dec., 62 absent since Sept. 14 [Cramptons Gap] now at home on furlough. He is shown on a list of wounded POW paroled by Gen. Franklin on Sept. 26, 1862. He is POW at Fort Henry, MD on Oct. 17, 1862. General Hospital # 12, Richmond; age 20; occupation, farmer; wounded Sept 14; right metacarpal of the thumb fract; flesh wounds of the side and leg; admitted; general health, good; furloughed on 28 Oct. for 40 days. Chimborazo Hospital # 2, May 6, 1863, "wound of right leg, flesh"; age 21; occupation farmer; town, Bowensville; county, Carroll; state, GA [wounded at Chancellorsville]. Returned to duty on May 15, 63. Oct. 7, 1863, he is in General Hospital, Farmville, VA, "Indolent" (?) right leg. "Has been wounded in several battles." Several receipts for clothing are included in the file. Nov.-Dec., 63 paid \$22. Aug. 7, 1863 he is at the General Hospital, Farmville, VA. Retired Nov. 1, 1864. May-June, 1864 absent in hospital. On register of Invalid Corps at Newnan, GA on Nov. 24, 1864. On his Carroll Co. pension application he states that he was wounded by gun shot at Cramptons Gap in joint of right shoulder, just above right ankle with loss of 1 1/2 inch of bone and in the left side below the nipple with the loss of 1 rib. Wounded again in the leg at Chancellorsville resulting in the leg being useless. Dew pension in Carroll Co. through 1915. Died in Sept., 1916 in Villa Rica. Widow, Anna, drew pension at least through 1938. Buried in Cross Plains Cemetery. Born, Feb. 10, 1842 Died, Sept. 5, 1916 The 1870 CC Census shows him as 28 years old working farm in Carrollton District with wife Margaret (22) and three children.

Whisenhunt, Adam C.

Private

Enlisted on March 4, 1862 at Carrollton by Lt. Hood
 July-Nov., 1862 absent, sick. Nov., 62 absent, sick in Carrollton since Oct. 21. Several receipts for clothing. Nov.-Dec., 62, present. May-June, 1864., present on extra duty as blacksmith with division train. July-Aug., 64, present, detailed as blacksmith with division train. Listed among those surrendered by Gen. Robert E. Lee at Appomattox Court House on April 9, 1865. He is listed on the Appomattox Surrender list him as a member of Company G, Cobb's Legion. This is a mistake and he should be listed as Company F. He filed for his pension in Coweta County. His widow, Alabama M., drew a pension in Carroll Co. They 1860 CC Census shows him as a 31-year-old farmer of the Hickory Level District. Wife, Sarah (19) and son, Asbury (1). In the next census, he is in the Carrollton District, a miller, with Sarah and five children.

White, Bennett H.3rd Corporal, 4th Sergeant

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.
 July-Nov., 1862, present. Nov.-Dec., 62, absent. July 62, Carroll County, GA on sick leave. General Hospital # 2, Richmond B. White 3rd Sgt. Date of injury, May 3, 1863 (Chancellorsville) GSW (gun shot wound) arm and shoulder requiring "seapula". Wound severe. Furloughed 60 days. Residence Athens, GA. May-June 1864 card does not state whether absent or present. June 8, 64 several receipts for clothing from Jackson Hospital in Richmond. June 23, 64 he was admitted to Jackson Hospital, "Rheumatism." Returned to duty July 28, 64. July-Aug., 1864 "Retired" 1 August, 1864. No further cards regarding his retirement. August 2, 1864, Hospital Duty at Athens, GA. There are several pay vouchers while at Athens. A note is included in this man's file dated June 23, 1916. "Respectfully returned to the Commissioner of Pensions, State of Georgia, Atlanta. The records show that Bennett White, Corporal and 4th Sergeant Co. F, Infantry Batts. Cobb's Legion Georgia CSA enlisted Aug. 15, 1861 and the company muster roll of July-Aug., (1864 ?) drafted Jan. 20, 1865 and last on file shows him retired August 1, 1864. No later records of him have been found. He evidently retired from the Army of Northern Virginia but did further service as a hospital steward in Athens or was admitted as a patient and still considered to be in the Army.

The 1860 census shows him living in the Fairplay District-Flint Hill, a 35-year-old farmer born in North Carolina. Wife, Susan (29) and children, Zachary (11), Mary (9), Elizabeth (6), Georgia A. L. (3) and Joseph (2 ½ mos.).

Williams, Arthur R.

Private

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.
 Killed at Crampton's Gap MD on Sept. 14, 1862. July-Nov., 1862, Mortally wounded at Crampton's Gap MD Sept. 14, 1862 and on Register of Officers and soldiers of the Confederate States who were killed in battle or died from disease. Where born, Henry County, GA., When deceased, September 14, 1862. Killed in battle

Williamson, John Thomas

Private

Captain Moore lists this man as John T. "Williamson" while the Annie Wheeler list shows him as Thomas "Williams".
 Enlisted Feb. 15, 1862 and died July 14, 1862 (also given as July 15). Claim of deceased by whom presented, Levi J. W. Turner, Atty. Where died, near Richmond. Amt. found due, \$77.26. J. R. Williamson, father, stated that he "left no wife or child."

Winkle, William J. (Winkles)

Private

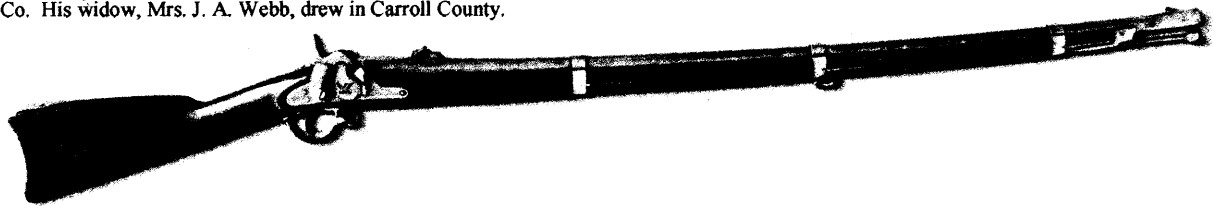
Enlisted at Carrollton on August 15, 1861 by Captain Powell. Age 17.8
 The Annie Wheeler roster and family descendents lists him as Winkles but the Compiled Service Records have it Winkle. Nov.-Dec., 1861 he is listed as present. Nov., 61 he is shown as enlisted man on extra duty for Field and Staff [Officers]. Nov.-Jan. 16, 61, occupied building officer's quarters, rate of pay 25c. July-Nov., 62 he is listed as absent sick. Nov.-Dec., 62, absent leave extended to January, 1863. Chimborazo Hospital # 2, Richmond admitted May 6, 1863, wounded at Chancellorsville in the arm. Transferred to Lynchburg May 8, 63. There is then a card dated November, 1863 which states: "died at Carrollton, GA" Then the file goes on: June 8, 1864 admitted to Stuart Hospital. Richmond. Diagnosis "M. S. left leg, m. ball". Furloughed June 11, 64 30 days. Wounded at Cold Harbor. He drew a pension in Coweta Co. and in Carroll Co.. In his application he states that he lost the index finger of his left hand at Chancellorsville in May, 1863. Captain Powell signed his pension application.
 The 1860 CC Census shows William J. Winkle (16), a farmer, living at home in the 5th District-Chanceville with father James Joseph (38) mother, Nancy(40) and 6 siblings. Why the "died in Carrollton" card? He is buried in the Hinesley Cemetery, born Dec. 1, 1843.

Wray, Andrew F.

Private

Enlisted August 15, 1861 at Carrollton by Captain Powell.
 Captain Moore's June, 1863 roll shows this man dead at Lynchburg, VA February 26, 1863. The Annie Wheeler roster of Company F published in 1910 shows an "A. S. Ray". There are no records for a "Ray" in Company F Archives. Nov., 1861 he is listed as present. July-Nov., 62 he is listed as present. August 2, 1862, present, bounty of \$50 due him. He is on the Register of Officers and soldiers who died in battle or from wounds or disease. When deceased, February 26, 1863, Lynchburg General Hospital, disease, typhoid. We have found one member of Company C, Cobb's Legion, Infantry buried in the Methodist Protestant Church Cemetery in Bowdon:

Webb, Bryce Born, Nov. 8, 1824 Died, Sept. 1, 1901. He enlisted in Atlanta in March, 1862. A farmer. Drew pension in Carroll Co. His widow, Mrs. J. A. Webb, drew in Carroll County.



APPENDIX G

COMPANY F COBB'S LEGION INFANTRY

KNOWN AS:

POWELL'S INVINCIBLES-and later as:-TOM COBB'S INVINCIBLES

This Company was recruited in Carroll County and was a unit of Cobb's Georgia Legion, Infantry, serving along with Company B, The Bowdon Volunteers, for the entire war. A majority of the members seem to be from the eastern part of the county around Sand Hill, Villa Rica and Hickory Level with some from the Carrollton and other districts.

The Annie Wheeler Chapter United Daughters of the Confederacy/McDaniel-Curtis Camp United Confederate Veterans list of 1910 appeared in a *Souvenir-Historical* publication which purpose was to raise funds for the erection of the Confederate monument which stands on the Carroll County courthouse lawn in Carrollton today. This "Annie" list contains numerous misspelled names, leaves off many of the names of men who served in the company and list some who did not serve. These list were made 45 years after the close of the war and the memories of the old veterans was not as good as it once was.

The roll of Captain George W. Moore was published in the summer, 1993 issue of the Carroll County Genealogical Society Quarterly and was taken from the logbook of Captain Moore and was probably logged in May, 1863 after the Battle of Chancellorsville. Casualties are shown up through this action, but none for Gettysburg which was fought in July, 1863 or any subsequent actions of the Company. We know that the company had losses at Gettysburg and that Captain Moore was captured at Knoxville in November of that same year. The original copy of this log is at the Museum of the Confederacy in Richmond, VA. A valuable copy is at the Neva Lomason Library, Carrollton, GA. Captain Moore would certainly know the men of his company and it is reasonable to believe that the company would number no more than the sixty-six men listed at a time maybe after the Chancellorsville campaign of May, 1863.

The third list is ours and is compiled from service records and other reliable sources and includes a considerable number of men not included on either of the other lists while eliminating some of the names.

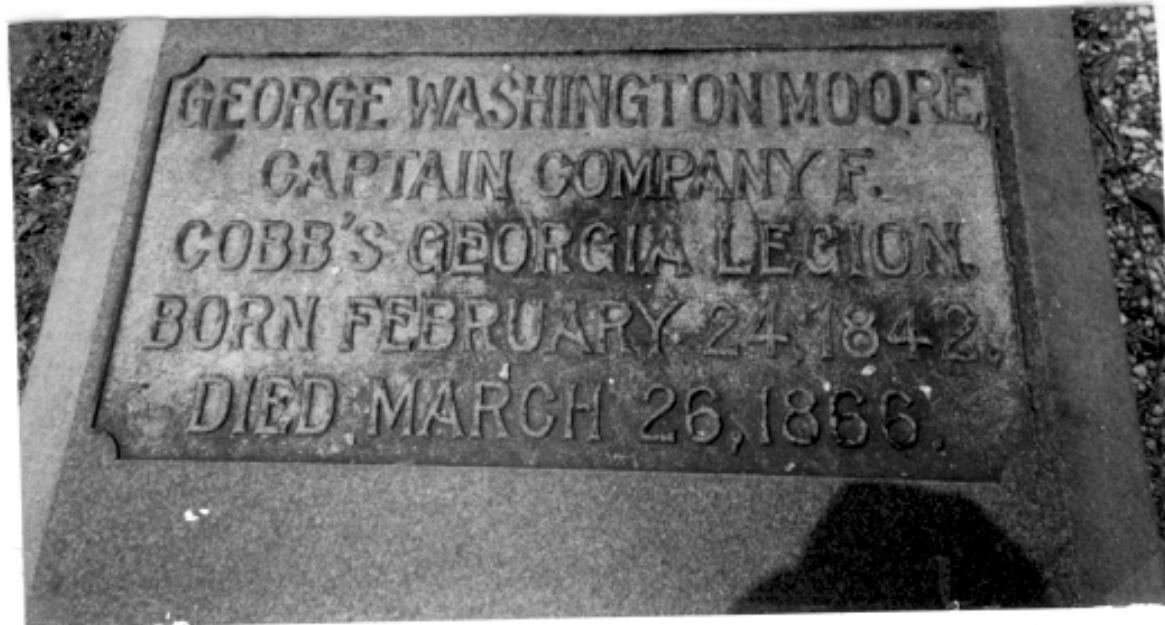
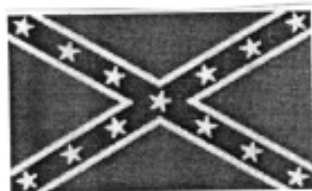
This company included more older men than were enrolled in Company B and it seemed to have trouble keeping good officers as several of the original officers of the company resigned shortly after the unit was formed in Carrollton on August 15, 1861. For instance, the second and third in command, 1st Lieutenant Thomas Hinesly and 2nd Lieutenant Madison I. Tyson both resigned on September 1, 1861, even before the unit reached Virginia. Captain Powell himself resigned in June of 1862 with less than a year of service behind him. The older average age probably resulted in a greater number of deaths due to disease and to the higher number of discharges and desertions. The replacement officers, especially Captain Moore and Lieutenant Charles Martin seemed to have given stability to the company. These were much younger men and both were former "Cadets" at Bowdon Academy and friends of Captain William Walker McDaniel of Company B. .

Almost all the men of the company were farmers; however, we found two ministers, one physician, five or more carpenters, at least four blacksmiths and two known students. There were at least three father-son combinations: George Aderhold and son Robert; Joseph Crews and sons Thomas and David and Sterling Hasterly and his son John. There were at least ten sets of brothers in the company: Moses and Samuel Baxter; Robert and Valentine Dale; John, William, and Wesley Gable; Abner and Merida Howell; Alphas and John Reynolds; Four men with the name of Starnes who might have been brothers (?); John and William Tyson and others.

The youngest members we found were 15 year-olds John Crews, Edmund Bearden, Benjamin Jordan and Wade Goldsby and 16 year-old Thomas Crews. The oldest members found were Joseph Crews 52, Sterling M.Hesterly 50 and 3rd Lt.George Aderhold who was over 47 years old when he deserted. A majority of the men were married and had children. A dozen members of the company boasted of having 5 or more while 1st Lt. Thoms Hinsley and Sgt. Jasper Hembree each had eight at home and even the first Captain, William F. S. Powell, and three others had seven.

The Annie Wheeler UDC roster of 1910 shows a total of 86 members of the company while Captain Moore's roll of June, 1863 after Chancellorsville, shows 101 men serving or who had served in the company. Our research has turned up a total of 133 men who served at one time or another during the war in Company F, Cobb's Legion, Infantry Battalion. We have at least four additional men who are listed on one or more rolls who might have served but can not be sure of. As many as 137 men could have been members of Company F.

This Carroll County company had losses of Killed in Action or who died from disease of 36% of the members who served. Another terrible waste added to those in Company B, Cobb's Legion, Infantry and other units of Carroll County men such as those in the 7th, 19th, 34th, 41st and 56th Georgia Infantry and numerous other infantry, artillery and cavalry units.
